Anchored on Connectivism Theory, ATS are viewed as intelligent systems that can detect and respond to students' emotional states through real-time interaction and feedback. By combining emotional support with academic learning, these systems can help students manage their emotions, remain engaged, and experience more meaningful learning. Evidence from both international and Nigerian studies indicates that ATS can transform negative emotional states into positive ones, thereby improving motivation and academic outcomes. Given the prevalence of emotional challenges and limited support structures in Nigerian schools, the adoption of ATS offers a promising solution. The study therefore recommends the integration of emotionally responsive technologies, improved digital infrastructure, and adequate teacher training.

While studies in developed contexts show that ATS can enhance engagement and emotional regulation, their use in Nigerian schools remains limited. This gap underscores

Empirical insights from Nigerian studies such as Akinwale and George (2021) and Isaac (2024) suggest that technology-enhanced learning environments can improve student engagement and reduce anxiety when interactive and supportive features are incorporated. These findings indicate that adaptive and intelligent systems have the potential to contribute not only to cognitive achievement but also to emotional well-being. These tools not only provide information but also help learners build connections between concepts, resources, and experiences, thereby enhancing understanding and knowledge retention. For school-going adolescents, connectivism is particularly relevant because it aligns with their increasing use of technology in learning. It encourages active participation, collaboration, and self-directed learning. Within this context, technology-enhanced learning environments, including Affective Tutoring Systems (ATS), function as part of the broader learning network. These systems provide personalized content, real-time feedback, and continuous guidance, enabling students to learn at their own pace while engaging with relevant resources. Importantly, connectivism also supports the emotional dimension of learning. By enabling learners to interact with supportive systems and resources, it reduces feelings of isolation and anxiety often associated with rigid and traditional learning environments. In this perspective, learning is understood as the ability to build, maintain, and navigate networks of information rather than relying solely on knowledge transmission from a single source. Empirical findings from Nigerian universities show that students' use of online learning resources positively influences their academic performance and overall learning experience. For example, research conducted among undergraduates at Obafemi Awolowo University revealed that students who frequently engaged with digital learning materials tended to achieve better learning outcomes. However, the degree of impact varied depending on factors such as access to quality resources, individual learning preferences, and the availability of supporting digital infrastructure (Fasanmi, 2025). This aligns with a central idea of connectivism, which emphasizes learners' capacity to locate, evaluate, and connect information distributed across digital networks. Further empirical studies also show how



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emerging technologies are transforming educational practices in Nigeria. Innovations such as artificial intelligence, virtual reality, and various digital platforms have been found to improve personalization, accessibility, and inclusiveness in learning environments (Akinwumi et al., 2025). These technologies enhance connectivist learning by enabling students to interact with multiple sources of information, collaborate with peers, and engage in independent exploration. Despite these advantages, challenges such as inadequate infrastructure, insufficient teacher training, and policy limitations continue to restrict the full implementation of technology-driven learning approaches. Research on Internet of Things (IoT) applications in Nigerian education further illustrates the practical relevance of connectivism in TEL environments. IoT-based systems create interconnected ecosystems where devices, users, and data interact in real time, supporting continuous knowledge exchange and adaptive learning experiences. Such systems allow for personalized learning pathways and collaborative knowledge construction, which are consistent with connectivist principles that view learners as interconnected nodes within a broader knowledge network (Onayinka et al., 2024). Nevertheless, issues such as financial constraints, weak infrastructure, and digital inequality remain significant barriers to widespread adoption. In addition, studies on mobile learning in Nigeria provide further evidence supporting connectivism, particularly in improving access to education. Although mobile phone usage is widespread, challenges remain in terms of meaningful connectivity and digital literacy among learners. Mobile technologies have been shown to encourage flexible learning, active engagement, and access to educational content beyond the classroom, thereby promoting network-based interactions (Zenodo, 2025). However, the effectiveness of mobile learning is influenced by factors such as unstable internet connectivity, limited technical competence, and inadequate institutional support. Overall, empirical evidence from Nigeria suggests that connectivism offers a valuable framework for understanding technology-enhanced learning in a context where digital adoption is growing but infrastructural support is uneven. While digital technologies enable learners to participate in interconnected knowledge networks, achieving the full benefits of connectivism learning depends on addressing systemic challenges related to access, equity, and usability. Collectively, the literature indicates a gradual shift toward a network-oriented learning model in Nigeria, though sustained progress will require coordinated efforts in policy development, infrastructure improvement, and capacity building.
